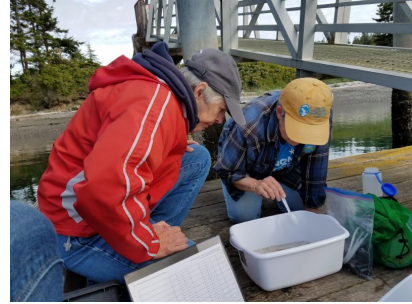
New Horizons for Commissioner Bell

Study Examines How Dungeness Survive

The Swinomish Indian Tribal Community has initiated a study examining the larval and juvenile stages of Dungeness crab in hopes of learning more about their survival to adulthood. This spring, traps will be deployed at five locations on Fidalgo and Whidbey island, including the Coupeville Wharf. Larval crab drawn into light traps will be retrieved, counted and released the following day. Monitoring will be conducted with the help of volunteers. Dog Park Improvements Underway

A community advisory group is finalizing recommendations to the Port of Coupeville for improvements to the dog park area at Greenbank Farm. The group, whose members have been meeting since November, is expected to encourage improved park signage and identification of the off-leash park boundaries. The Port plans to install fencing along the eastern agriculture zone this spring to protect leased farm parcels. New maps outlining park boundaries and rules will be provided at kiosks. Trimming the Trees

The farm's orchard was recently pruned after years of neglect by island tree specialist Dan Vorhis of Muscle and Arm Farm. Dan tackled six apple and pear trees with the help of facilities lead Brian Hutchins. With a little water and nutrients, the sixty-year old trees are expected to rebound beautifully. The Port hopes to expand the orchard this spring with peach and other tree varieties.

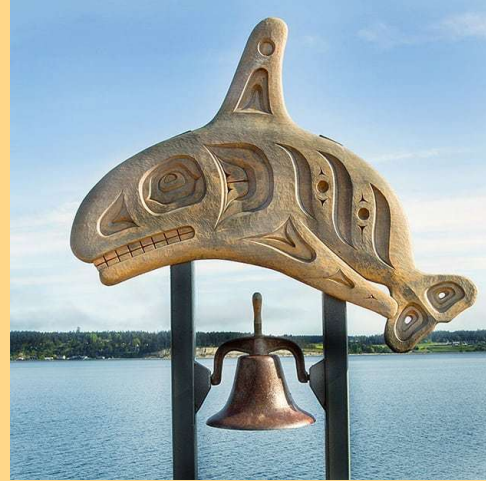
